Finding 1: Apache County Attorney's Office should improve policies and procedures over administration of Diversion/Deferred Prosecution Program

To help ensure that its policies and procedures for administering the Program are current, the County Attorney's Office should have a process in place to update its policies and procedures when changes are made to the APAAC Guidelines. In addition, these policies and procedures should include detailed instructions for program eligibility determinations, enrollment processing, fee charges, payment receipts, monitoring participant progress, successful and unsuccessful terminations, and mandated reporting.

To help ensure the County Attorney's Office complies with the APAAC Guidelines, it should ensure compliance is documented and retained in accordance with its recordsretention policy.
