## Teacher pay

- On average, each teacher and librarian earned an additional $\$ 2,514$ to $\$ 2,550$ in base and performance pay. Additionally, each teacher participating in menu money programs earned up to $\$ 4,425$, and each participating instructional aide earned up to $\$ 2,038$.


## Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on school performance.
- Each school demonstrated improved student achievement on district tests.
- Student attendance was above 96 percent.
- Most teachers maintained a 97 percent attendance rate and participated in professional development.
- Committees were formed to enhance curriculum.
- Parent-student workshops were held.


## Menu

- 3 teachers were hired to accommodate 8 percent district growth.
- More than 600 students participated in after-school tutoring, academic activities, and clubs.
- 150 students at risk of dropping out participated in summer school programs.
- Alternative educational classrooms were established for students who needed individualized instruction.
- Professional development activities were also funded.
