



District-reported 2003 results

Teacher pay

On average, each teacher earned an additional \$2,700 in salary, and each librarian, counselor, and facilitator earned an additional \$900, which includes performance pay distributed in fiscal year 2004.

Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on school and individual performance.
- The number of students reading at grade level increased by 7 percent, on average.
- Each teacher tutored 5 students in reading.

Menu

- Monies were primarily used to pay for AIMS intervention activities, including all-day kindergarten at one school, reading tutoring for at-risk students, a language camp, and before- and after-school programs.
- 1 school hired instructional aides to reduce class sizes.
- 2 facilitators were hired to provide staff development and mentor teachers at 2 schools. 20 students, who otherwise may have been suspended or expelled, received instruction in an alternative setting.
