



## District-reported 2003 results

### Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher and counselor earned an additional \$800 in salary.

### Performance

- The District accomplished most of its goals, which were based on district, school, and individual performance.
- Most teachers met the 97 percent attendance goal. Student attendance was 97 percent.
- Teachers completed assigned curriculum materials.
- Schools successfully generated positive school environments through a number of activities, including positive communication with parents, family nights, motivational speakers, and enhanced recognition and awards programs.

### Menu

 Monies were used to hire an instructional aide to help reduce class size and to hire a counselor to work with students at risk of dropping out of school. The counselor taught life skills courses, acted as a liasion between school and home, and sought opportunities for students.
