



Proposition 301

District-reported 2004 results

Teacher pay

 On average each teacher, librarian, speech pathologist, audiologist, and counselor earned an additional \$2,300 to \$2,400 in salary, which does not include menu pay tied to AIMS intervention activities.

Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on school performance.
- Student achievement goals were linked to students' standardized test scores and other measures.
- Student and teacher attendance rates at each school were 95 percent or higher.
- Parents and students gave schools at least an 80 percent satisfaction rating.
- The number of parent volunteer and student community work hours exceeded school goals.

Menu

- Monies were used solely for AIMS intervention.
- Teachers and instructional aides were hired to identify and work with at-risk students.
- About 40 percent of teachers earned stipends for coordinating AIMS intervention activities, acting as instruction specialists or mentors, and for tutoring students. 1,052 students with failing grades were required to attend tutoring sessions, and 78 percent of these students improved their grades.
