

Teacher pay

• On average, each teacher, librarian, speech pathologist, and audiologist earned an additional \$2,400 in salary.

Performance

- The District accomplished most of its goals, which were based on school performance.
- Teacher attendance was 95 percent or greater.
- Parents and students gave schools at least an 80 percent satisfaction rating.
- School goals were met relating to student community service, student achievement on standardized tests, teacher development, and parent volunteer hours.
- Student attendance at most schools was 95 percent.

Menu

- Monies were used primarily for AIMS intervention.
- Teachers and instructional aides were hired to work with at-risk students during and after school.
- More than 1,100 middle-school students attended afterschool homework labs.
- Monies were also used to pay 18 teachers for mentoring.
