



Proposition 301 expenditures were 3.20 percent of the District's \$7,156,798 current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher earned an additional \$3,417 in compensation.
- Teachers were hired to reduce reading, English, math, and science class sizes. Reading classes were kept to 20 students. English class sizes were reduced by 2 students on average, while math and science class sizes were lowered by 4 students.
- The 6th- through 12th-grade dropout rate decreased by approximately 2 percent, overall.
- 39 teachers accomplished individual attendance goals that required fewer teacher absences.
- 40 elementary- and 19 middle- and high-school teachers completed 1 or more levels of the District's technology plan.
