## Teacher pay

- On average, each teacher, librarian, and counselor earned between $\$ 3,757$ and $\$ 4,157$ in additional salary.


## Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on school performance.
- Each school set student achievement goals in reading, writing, and math. 76 schools accomplished all goals and 10 partially accomplished the goals.
- Other goals related to dropout and graduation rates.


## Menu

- Monies were primarily used to increase teacher base and performance pay.
- For AIMS intervention, 72 percent of schools hired instructional aides and tutors, 4 schools held summer-school programs, and 22 schools purchased supplemental materials.
- For dropout prevention, 19 schools provided alternative learning centers, 27 provided tutoring, 1 sponsored a student decision-making program, and 3 provided summer or Saturday school programs.
- 57 percent of teachers participated in professional development activities.
- Additionally, the District continued to use monies for class size reduction.
