Proposition 301 expenditures were 3.49 percent of the District's $\$ 25,719,721$ current operating expenditures in fiscal year 2002.

## District-reported 2002 results

- On average, each teacher earned an additional \$3,950 in compensation, which includes performance pay distributed in fiscal year 2003.
- 2 elementary schools used the monies for reading remediation. The schools' overall AIMS scores increased by 3.9 and 9.7 percent.
- Class sizes were reduced by 1 to 3 students in physical education, music, kindergarten, 6th grade, music/band, and drama classes.
- The number of course failures at one school declined by one-third after the school began calling the parents of students who were absent for unknown reasons.
- The high school hired a person to staff a career center.
- Monies also paid for reading and math workshops for elementary school teachers.
