



### District-reported 2003 results

#### Teacher pay

 On average, each teacher and counselor earned an additional \$3,333 in salary; each librarian earned an additional \$3,376; and each behavioral specialist and teacher on assignment earned an additional \$1,439.

#### Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on school performance.
- Student achievement on tests increased substantially.
- Teachers attended professional development courses.
- Schools worked to increase contacts with parents via telephone calls, in-person meetings, periodic progress reports, and open houses.

#### Menu

- Monies were primarily used to increase eligible employee compensation.
- Tutors were hired for AIMS intervention.
- Dropout prevention activities included after-school help with school assignments, a homework hotline, and a Saturday school program for high school students.
- Professional development activities were also provided.
