Subject: Isaac Elementary School District—Still in Noncompliance with the USFR

Dear Members of the Arizona State Board of Education:

In accordance with Arizona Revised Statutes (A.R.S.) §15-271, we are notifying you that Isaac Elementary School District (District) is still in noncompliance with the *Uniform System of Financial Records for Arizona School Districts* (USFR) based on our review of the District's fiscal year (FY) 2024 financial audit reports and USFR Compliance Questionnaire (Questionnaire). As required, we are providing you a list of the most significant USFR deficiencies we noted in those reports, including the District exceeding its Maintenance & Operation (M&O) and Unrestricted Capital Outlay (UCO) Fund budget limits by \$5,372,861 and \$13,904,228, respectively, which caused the District to incur significant losses and corresponding significant deficit fund balances and District's management expressing substantial doubt about the District's ability to continue as a going concern.

The following summarizes our past notifications and Arizona State Board of Education (State Board) action related to the District's continued noncompliance with the USFR:

- July 2024—We notified the District that it had not complied with the USFR based on our review of the significant deficiencies cited in its FY 2023 financial audit reports and Questionnaire. The District had 90 days to correct its deficiencies, but it did not do so.
- December 2024—We notified the State Board that the District was not ready for a status review to determine if it is no longer in noncompliance with the USFR based on assertions in its submitted October 2024 corrective action plan and discussions with District management. We also communicated concerns that the District may have overspent its M&O and UCO Fund budget limits by several million dollars, but the Maricopa County School Superintendent's Office and the Arizona Department of Education were prevented from determining the overexpenditure amounts based on the District's unreliable and inaccurate FY 2024 annual financial report.

- January 2025—The State Board held a hearing regarding the District’s overexpenditures and appointed a receiver who may take action as prescribed A.R.S. §15-103(F).
- July 2025—We notified the State Board that the District was in noncompliance with audit reporting requirements because it had not submitted its FY 2024 financial audit reports and Questionnaire, which were due on March 31, 2024.
- October 2025—We notified the State Board that the District submitted its FY 2024 financial audit reports and Questionnaire, which were 6 months late.

Further, we will continue to assist the District as it works to correct its internal control deficiencies. For example, we provided the District an updated corrective action plan template to document corrective actions taken to comply with the USFR, and we will schedule periodic meetings with the District receiver and management to discuss the District’s implemented and planned corrective actions. When the District can show it has corrected its deficiencies, my Office may perform a status review to determine if the District is no longer in noncompliance with the USFR, and we will inform you of the results.
