




Classroom Dollars

District-reported 2003 results

Teacher pay

- On average, each teacher, counselor, and librarian earned an additional \$2,411 in salary.

Performance

- The District accomplished its goals, which were based on district, school, and individual performance.
- Student achievement goals were linked to standardized test scores and, for special education students, achievement of 70 percent of Individualized Education Program (IEP) goals.
- Other goals called for the implementation of a school disciplinary program; and for teachers to create parent newsletters, work with students to plan and hold assemblies, and complete between 16 and 30 hours of professional development activities.

Menu

- Monies were used to increase eligible employee compensation.
- For AIMS intervention, a math tutor was hired.
- For dropout prevention, a middle school counselor and a high school life skills teacher were hired to work with students at-risk of dropping out.
